

Housatonic Museum of Art is an important resource both for the college and the region. Although the Burt Chernow Galleries were closed for renovation last year, twenty-two thematic displays under the rubric *Object Lessons* were installed throughout the campus. Additionally, dedicated spaces within the college were established to showcase the Museum's extensive holdings of African art, Latin American art and Native American art and artifacts.

Highlights from last year include a new web-based series called *Three Questions*, video interviews that feature in-depth conversations

with artists and collectors who have contributed work to the Museum's collection. The first set features Ann Chernow, art and wife of the founder of the Museum; Ben Ortiz, an HCC alumnus, curator and collector; and photographers Sean Kernan and Hans Neleman whose work was featured in the photographic display, *Telling Portraits*.

The HMA also received a generous gift of fifty-four works from the Friends of James Daugherty Foundation, Inc., that included drawings and studies by James Henry Daugherty and his daughter-in-law, Lisa Daugherty. This gift offers our students a wonderful opportunity to learn about this American modernist painter, WPA muralist, children's book author, and illustrator through this rich archive.

Conservation work continued with the restoration of a painting by abstract painter and art theorist, Georges Mathieu and two light constructions by Josef Levi.

The **Werth Student Docent Program** offered supplemental arts education for 125 middle school students and the opportunity for students to conduct tours for over 400 of their classmates.

Housatonic Community College created an **Ophthalmic Assistant Program** with a generous donor, funded through the HCC Foundation to help train students for in-demand careers as ophthalmic medical personnel.

The program prepares students to become part of an eye-care team. Through lectures, case study and hands-on learning, students come away with entry-level knowledge and skills to assist an ophthalmologist in the diagnosis and care of patients. This nine-month course enables students to be employable upon course completion!

The program is taught by Scott Spector, M.D., the Founder and Medical Director of Spector Eye Care and New Vision Cataract and Laser Center in Connecticut, who founded the program and generously donated the teaching equipment.

The **Family Economic Security Program (FESP)** completed its fourth year as an exemplary model program for student retention and achievement.

FESP provides critical opportunities for students to achieve educational and wage-sustaining career advancement. Students are successful because of FESP's holistic support that includes academic advising, mentoring, financial and career coaching, summer classes and camperships for student's children, as well as assistance with tuition and emergency aid.

Over the last four years, 413 students have benefited from FESP. These students are retaining at a 30% higher rate compared to other students at the College! To date, 182 students have graduated and transferred to four year institutions. And, the FESP model has been adopted at Gateway Community College!

The program's impact has been possible through an innovative partnership between Housatonic Community College, the Housatonic Community College Foundation, Fairfield County's Community Foundation and its Fund for Women & Girls. Generous donors continue to ensure that this program and its students thrive.

The American Manufacturing Hall of Fame (AMHoF) inducted The Class of 2018 at its Fifth Annual Induction Ceremony. Four Connecticut companies were the latest to join: Cheney Brothers (Manchester), Farrel-Pomini (Ansonia), Handy & Harman (Fairfield), Timex Group USA (Middlebury). With the Class of 2018, twenty-five companies are now a part of the Hall of Fame. The Hall of Fame also honored Robert J. Klancko, Partner, Klancko & Klancko. At this special event, over \$35,000 was raised for student scholarships.

The Advanced Manufacturing Technology Center, now in its 7th year, celebrated 56 graduates. The College Connections Program, a partnership with Bridgeport Public Schools and Bassick High School, began its sixth year, and the Introduction To Manufacturing Overview program entered its fourth year of preparing students to enroll in the AMTC certificate.

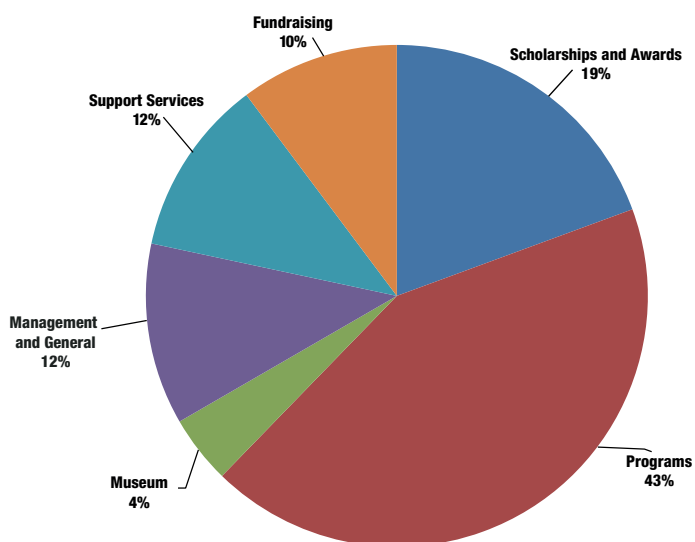

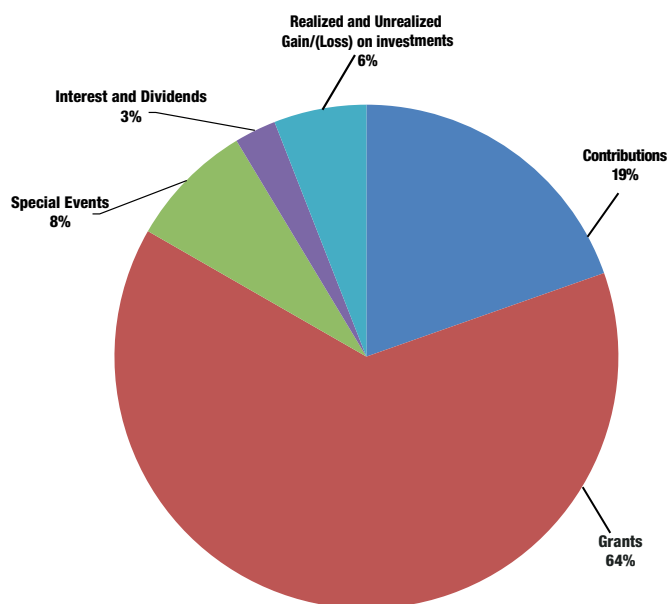

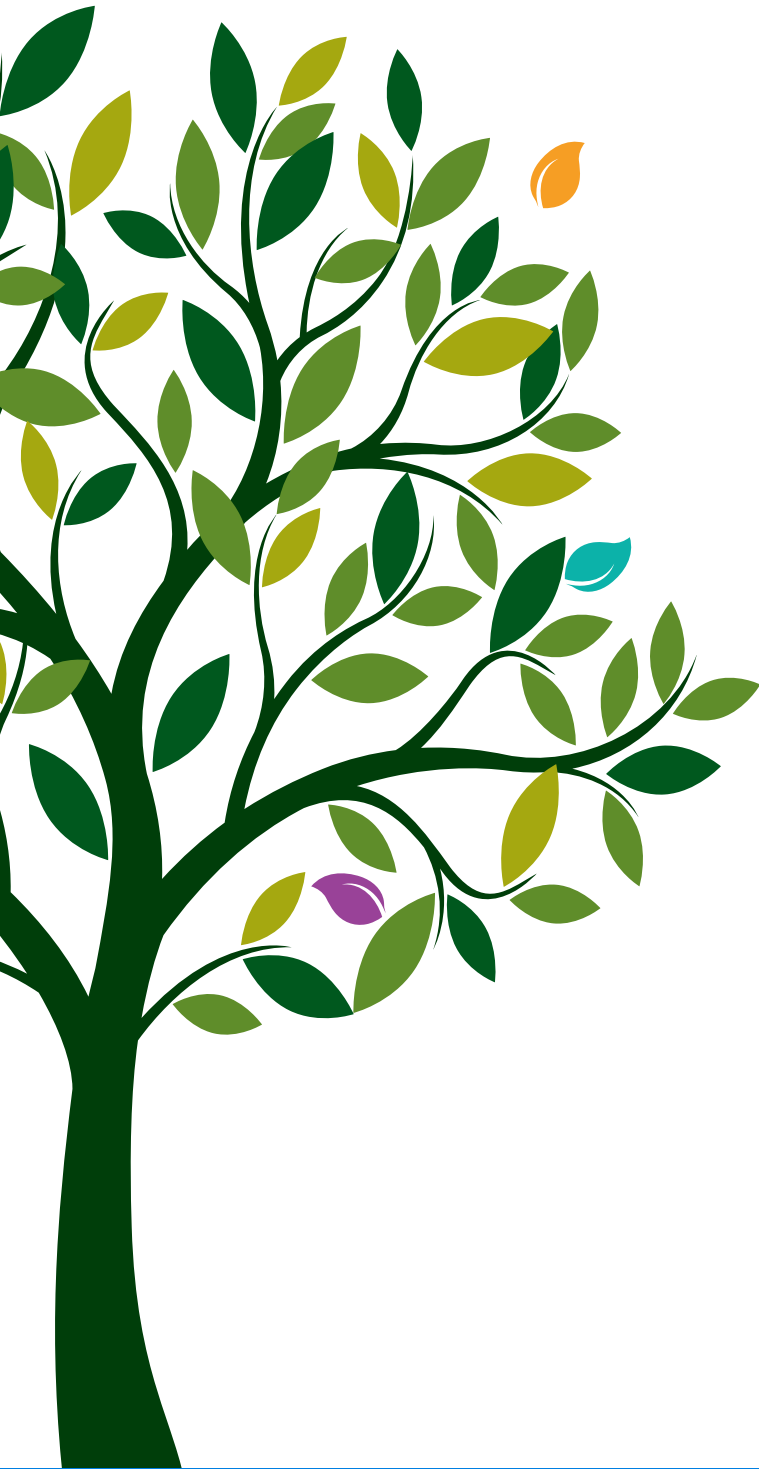
